BACKGROUND TO I PETER

AUTHOR OF THE LETTER:

• Peter, the Apostle

WRITTEN TO:

- Believers scattered throughout Northern Asia Minor
- All believers everywhere

DATE AND PLACE OF WRITING:

- Approximately A.D. 64
- From Babylon

THEME:

Hope

PURPOSE FOR WRITING:

- To encourage Christians to stand fast in the grace of God
- To comfort believers in their suffering
- To bring believers into spiritual maturity and into a life of strength, blessing and hope



FIRST DAY: The Introduction

- 1. Review the Introduction on page one of this lesson. In what way does it affect your desire to study I Peter?
- 2. Note the phrase, sentence or thought that especially caught your attention.
 - a. Share why.
- 3. With the Introduction in mind take a moment to write a prayer to the Lord expressing your greatest desire in relationship to your study of I Peter.

SECOND DAY: The Author

- 1. Notice from the Background on page two that Peter is the author of I Peter. There is more written about Peter in the New Testament than any of the other apostles. Choose a few of the following references about Peter and write a short phrase describing the event:
 - a. Matthew 4:18-20
 - b. Matthew 14:25-33
 - c. Matthew 17:1-13
 - d. Matthew 26:69-75
 - e. Acts 3:1-10
 - f. Acts 10:9-16; 28
 - g. Acts 12:1-11

Challenge: From John 1:40, 42 list Peter's other names.

a. Record the meaning of the name: <i>Peter</i> .			
2. What stands out the most to you about Peter's life?			
And Simon Peter answered and said, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Matthew 16:16			
THIRD DAY: The Recipients and Date and Place of Writing			
1. Read and compare I Peter 1:1 with the Background information on page two concerning the recipients of this letter. Where were these believers living?			
a. Highlight or circle the names of these provinces on the map on page two.			
Advanced Students: What was happening around A. D. 64 that may have caused the Christians to scatter?			
2. Bible commentators agree that it is difficult to determine the exact background of the exiles that Peter addressed in his letter. They also agree that these exiles included both Jews and Gentile believers. How does I Peter 2:10; 4:3 support this view?			
3. According to I Peter 5:13, where was Peter when he wrote this letter?			
Note: If this reference to Babylon was literal, he may have been writing from Mesopotamia (Babylon on the Euphrates) or Old Cairo (Babylon on the Nile). If the location was symbolic, as many Bible scholars believe, he was referring to Rome.			

FOURTH DAY: The Theme of I Peter
