These verses are a rich combination of practical instruction and powerful motivation for a Christian's conduct, especially when suffering unjustly. Preview these verses by reading I Peter 2:18-25 and writing verse 20 here phrase by phrase.

3. To receive the most from this key passage of Peter's letter, begin your study with prayer. Express to the Lord your deepest desire and greatest need concerning your lesson. Write your prayer here.

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SECOND DAY: Read I Peter 2:18-20

51	SCOND DAT: Read 1 Peter 2:18-20
1.	Practical instruction concerning Christian conduct is given in I Peter 2:18-20. In the previous verses from Chapter Two we learned about our conduct in relationship to civil authorities. What relationship does Peter address in I Peter 2:18?
	a. In this verse the word servants refers to household or domestic slaves. The instructions given to servants can be applied in our culture to employer/employee relationships. With this in mind write Peter's instruction from verse 18.
2.	The phrase <i>be subject</i> in I Peter 2:18 could be translated <i>be submissive</i> . The phrase <i>with all fear</i> means <i>with respect</i> . The Christian slave was to <i>submit</i> and <i>respect</i> his master whether he was <i>good</i> and <i>gentle</i> or <i>froward</i> (overbearing, unjust, unreasonable, harsh). Write what the following verses reveal about God's perspective on this:
	a. I Peter 2:19
	(1.) Thankworthy is the Greek word for grace. The phrase conscience toward God has been translated conscious or mindful of God. How would awareness of God enable or encourage a person to endure under these circumstances?
	(a.) What effect would this have on a believer's witness?
	b. I Peter 2:20
	(1.) Think about the behavior that <i>is acceptable with God</i> or pleases Him. With this in mind how does the phrase <i>take it patiently</i> speak to you today?
3.	Read Colossians 3:22-24 to expand your understanding of servant/master relationships. Summarize what these verses teach us about this.

THIRD DAY: Read I Peter 2:21-24

1.	The content of I Peter 2:21-24 is so powerful and inspiring we have chosen to devote two days of
	our lesson to focus on these verses. Center your mind and heart on verse 21 as you write it here
	phrase by phrase.
