SECOND DAY: Read II Corinthians 1:1,2

1.	In II Corinthians 1:1,2 the author began his letter with a salutation. How did he introduce himself? verse 1a
	a. Notice the phrase, by the will of God. How does this validate Paul's credentials as an apostle?
Ch	nallenge: II Corinthians 1:1 reveals that Timothy was with Paul when he wrote this letter. Use the following verses to write a brief profile of Timothy: Acts 16:1; II Timothy 1:2a,5; I Corinthians 4:17.
2.	According to II Corinthians 1:1b to whom was the letter written?
	a. We know that Paul founded and established this church, yet in verse 1 he described it as <i>the church of God</i> . What does this tell you about:
	(1.) Paul
	(2.) the church
3.	Consider the second part of Paul's salutation in II Corinthians 1:2. Paul often greeted his readers with these words. <i>Grace</i> is the translation of the Greek word <i>charis</i> and was a familiar word of greeting among Greeks. <i>Peace</i> (<i>shalom</i>) was the usual Jewish greeting. Why are <i>grace</i> and <i>peace</i> essential for all believers?
	a. Through Whom do we have <i>grace</i> and <i>peace</i> ?
	b. What does it mean to you today to have:
	(1.) grace
	(2.) peace

THIRD DAY: Read II Corinthians 1:3-7

1.	II Corinthians 1:3-7 has been a great source of encouragement and strength for Christians in difficult times. Write Paul's declaration of praise from II Corinthians 1:3 phrase by phrase. Selah – pause and think about this.		
	a. In verse 3 the word <i>mercies</i> can be translated <i>compassions</i> . What do you learn about mercy and compassion from Lamentations 3:22,23?		
2.	The word <i>comfort</i> in II Corinthians 1:3 is the Greek word <i>paraklesis</i> which means <i>one who comes alongside to help.</i> Here it conveys the idea of <i>strengthening</i> and <i>encouraging</i> . Observe the scope of God's comfort as you read II Corinthians 1:3b,4a. What do you see?		
	a. Provide a few synonyms for the word <i>tribulation</i> .		
	(1.) God's often uses His Word to comfort believers. Share a scripture that has comforted you in a time of suffering or affliction.		
3.	3. The words <i>comfort</i> or <i>consolation</i> occur ten times in II Corinthians 1:3-7. Consider one purpos for God's <i>comfort</i> as you complete verse 4b:		
	that may be to them which are in any,		
	by the wherewith we are of God.		
	a. Briefly share how you have experienced this.		
	b. What qualities are developed through suffering that enable us to comfort others?		
4.	Read II Corinthians 1:5-7. Paul chose to use his suffering and affliction as a channel for God's comfort to other Christians. What was the <i>effectual</i> result according to verse 6?		
	a. Consider the Phillips' translation of verse 7: We are quite confident that if you have to suffer troubles as we have done, then, like us, you will find the comfort and encouragement of God. What assurance do you receive from this?		

5. How should II Corinthians 1:3-7 affect our attitude toward *tribulation* and *suffering*?

3.	Consider this powerful declaration from II Corinthians 1:9: <i>God which raiseth the dead</i> ! How do impossible situations become opportunities for God's power to be displayed?

FIFTH DAY: Read II Corinthians 1:10,11

- 1. Observe Paul's statement of faith in II Corinthians 1:10. Notice God's deliverance includes the past, present and future. Write verse 10, personalizing it by replacing the pronouns *us* and *we* with your name.
 - a. How does this verse minister to you?
- 2. Read II Corinthians 1:11. Paul attributed his rescue from death as a gift from God in answer to the Corinthian believers' prayers. What was their response? Answer from verse 11b.
- 3. As you recognize the effectiveness of prayer through II Corinthians 1:10,11, how are you inspired and motivated to pray?
